(Continued from page 1) Among the items which could be considered for funding by the increase in income are these:

 Enhanced deed restriction enforcement:

The DROCOM generally depends on the good will of residents to abide by the published deed restrictions. However, on some streets there is currently a lack of compliance despite notification of violations. In order to protect the attractiveness and livability of our neighborhood, it may become necessary to take legal action in some instances. This can become expensive very

quickly, depleting the Association's reserves.

 Professional assistance for the treasurer:

Currently our treasurer is a volunteer with a fulltime job. The responsibilities of this office include much more than just mailing assessment notices and receiving payments. Responding to mortgage inquiries is becoming quite time-consuming as more properties come up for sale in the subdivision. Employing an outside professional to assist with these duties would make the treasurer's job more manageable.

 Improve entrance markers: Some of the markers at the entrances to our subdivision have been broken or become discolored. The appearance of these would be improved by cleaning or replacing with brick or other more permanent materials, showing that SBOCA residents take

• Security patrols:

Despite the best efforts of our COP volunteers, we know that crime does occur sometimes. Although full-time security is not an option, due to cost, with additional funding it may be possible to have some law enforcement presence in the neighborhood.

These are some of the possibilities your board is considering, and we would appreciate any feedback from SBOCA homeowners.

Ballots to vote on the proposed assessment increase will be mailed to each homeowner in September, with final voting to be completed at the October General Meeting.

REALTORS' NEIGHBOR-HOOD SURVEY

The Houston Chronicle recently published the

results of a Houston Association of Realtors' analysis of area subdivisions, based on residential property sales handled through Multiple Listing Service and local appraisal district records. "Median" is the middle, meaning half of the measurements are larger and half are smaller.

Here are the results shown for Spring Branch Oaks:

TIPS FOR GOOD WATERING PRACTICE

Summer is in full swing, and although we have been blessed with rain this year we still need to be conservative in our use of precious water. During the summer, lawn watering and other outdoor uses can account for 50% to 80% of home water use. Studies have shown that as much as half of this outdoor use is wasted through poor watering practices. The Texas Water Development Board has offered the following advice:

Water-wise steps

The first step in watering efficiently is to recognize that different areas require different amounts of water. For example, grass areas should be watered separately from shrubs, flowerbeds, and other plants.

The second step is to use proper watering equipment. Grass areas are best watered with sprinklers. Trees, shrubs, flowers, and ground-covers can be watered efficiently with low-volume drip, spray, soaker, or bubbler emitters.

The third step...is to keep equipment well-maintained. Regular adjustment of irrigation systems can save water and money.

Lawn watering practices Studies have shown that the typical lawn receives twice as much water as required to

maintain healthy grass.

 Know when to water by closely observing the grass. Look for a dull green color, footprints visible after walking, or curled grass.

- Determine how much water your sprinkler applies by setting out 3-5 cans near the edge of the sprinkler.
- Water during the early morning or evening hours since evaporation losses will be up to 60% higher during the day. Do not water on windy days. Set sprinklers so the lawn is watered, not driveways and sidewalks.
- Use an overlapping sprinkler pattern to cover the lawn evenly.
- Water can be applied less often to clay and loam soils than to sandy soil, but it should be applied more slowly to prevent runoff.
 St. Augustine grass generally needs to be watered only every 5 days.

- Do not cut grass too short.
 Longer blades of grass will reduce evaporation and root stress.
- Mow regularly with a sharp blade and leave clippings to mulch the lawn.
 When clippings are left, little additional fertilizer is needed.
- Use mulches in flower and shrub beds. Mulches cover and shade the soil, minimize evaporation, reduce weed growth, and slow erosion
- Shape the soil into earthen basins around all shrubs.
- Choose water-wise plants. Native and adapted plants will use less water and be resistant to local plant diseases and pests.
